HOPSCOTCHING



Top level Pentagon Conference, following closely on the heels of a EUCOM-wide parley, belies the fact that AA policy makers are readily aware of the mounting complexities of Army aviation's recent haphazard growth. The signs are multiplying that a large-scale "coordination" is in the offing. An "across the board" agreement on all facets of the coordination is the solution currently sought by the planners.

The long-existent AA synonym, "A branch officer first and an aviator second," may be reversed in the light of ever increasing demands made upon aviation personnel. With intricate and costly aircraft now quoted in terms of tonnage, passengers sooner or later may prefer to fly in aircraft flown and maintained by highly-trained technicians and not "Jacks of all trades."

The current apathy towards an aviation career in the military has not abated. The AF, anticipating it would select its first Academy class of 300 from 5,000 applicants, received only 500 applications. Another recruiting drive for AA primary training candidates indicates that the "mountain is going to Mahomet" and that Army aviation, despite its ostensible lure, is in a "buyers" market."

Although purely in the "hot stove" realm, many sources claim that a return to the noncommissioned flight status era of the forties will considerably bolster the field. They point to the de-emphasis on command responsibility that is associated with a new rating or designation today and the fact that the absence of the "OCS gauntlet" will return a greater yield of rated personnel. Looking at the field topside, the situation has or eventually will stagnate as hundreds of junior officers ultimately qualify themselves for higher staff positions.

Flight performance data in USAREUR, although not comparable in mileage or ton-miles flown, has approached 'airline status' and dependability. Recently released figures show that Army aviation in this sector, and undoubtedly in other sectors, fulfilled 40% of its missions under instrument conditions with less than 3% of the flights being cancelled because of weather conditions.

GARY AIR FORCE BASE, TEXAS — People in the military can always expect changes. Student Aviators in Primary Flight Training were recently reminded of this when they were told that they would not be going to Fort Sill for their advanced training but would proceed to the Army Aviation School at Camp Rucker, Alabama. The last Primary Flight Training class to attend the AATC at Fort Sill graduated here on 13 August 1954, All future classes will go directly to Camp Rucker.

Also, in view of the AAS move, AFF Helicopter Pilot Training Class 55 G-H, due to report here on 27 October 1954, will be cancelled and 55 H-H plus future helicopter classes will go to Camp Rucker.

A change in the schedule and number of students in the AFF Helicopter Pilot Training Program was recently approved by DA. Effective with Class 55 H-H reporting at Gary Air Force Base on 5 November 1954, there will be 27 students per class (an addition of four over previous classes) and a class reporting every three weeks. The course has been extended from 5 weeks at Gary AFB and 4 weeks at Fort Sill to 6 weeks at Gary AFB and 5 weeks at Camp Rucker.

A recommendation to replace the worn and tired Piper L-21 aircraft with the Cessna L-19 for primary training has been submitted. It is felt by most that the L-19 will prove to be a more economical and better trainer than the L-21. Now that the maximum height and weight limitations for Army aviation have been raised to 76 inches and 200 pounds, the L-19 is almost a necessity.

IT'S PAYING OFF!

Here in Stuttgart, Germany, the Seventh Army Board of Flight Examiners has been "on tour" for the past 4 months, performing Flying Safety inspections of unit aviation sections



and accomplishing flying proficiency checks of individual
pilots. The readers will recall that our Commanding General established this Board
last December and gave it the
mission of reducing the unreasonably high 'flying accident
rate' within the organization.
The initial approach to the
problem was the establishment
of an Instructor Pilot Standardization Course here at Echterdingen Army Airfield,
(Continued on the next page.)

During the first 3 months we graduated 28 highly qualified instructor pilots, representing all major units of Seventh Army. These people returned to their organizations and established formal programs of pilot standardization and refresher training for all flying personnel. The plan has met with the apparent whole-hearted approval of organization commanders and flying personnel. It has generated a spirit of friendly competition among the pilots themselves and has without question materially raised the general level of professional performance in our aircraft operations.

For the 1st 6 months of '54 our flying accident experience reflects comparison for the corresponding period of '53 as follows: Acrft accident rate per 100,000 flying hours - DOWN 32%; acrft accident monetary cost - DOWN 65%; Fatal acrft accident rate - DOWN 100%. At present the Board is conducting Instructor Pilot Standardization Course #4, the class consisting of 12 fixed-wing and 8 rotary-wing students. It is of 3 weeks duration and includes 45 hours of academic instruction and 54 hours of flight instruction. Upon completion the student receives a Board Certificate of IP qualification and official Seventh Army orders as an IP. The PREREQUISITES for receiving this course of instruction are: Min. of 500 hours of military 1st pilot time; min. of 100 hours in the type aircraft; min. of 18 months service remaining in this command.

Our training curriculum places heavy emphasis on forced landing techniques and short-field procedures in fixed-wing acrft, and on anti-torque failures in lower and flare autorotation landings in helicopters. Top proficiency in these have paid off handsomely during recent months for several of our people. I might add that it is POSSIBLE to wash out of this course and it has been done! The permanent membership of the Board as presently composed is: LT COL MILLER T NESBITT, President; CAPT FIORINO A CINQUANTA, Fixed-wing member; and Capt W. J. McHenry, Rotary-wing member. Presently assisting as instructors in the IP Course are: CAPT HAROLD B VAN DYKEN (5th Inf Div), CAPT FRED WERFELMAN (V Corps), and Capt Arthur L Hall (9th Inf Div). As a footnote, our Board members have no problem 'flying-time' wise. Since the 1st of the year we've given over 1,500 hours of flying instruction and have accomplished 350 check rides.

PEAK OPERATION

DATA: Our 29th Engr Co (Survey, Base) Aviation Section, which is organic to TO/E, was activated in March of this year following the transfer of the 29th Engr Co from the Philippine Islands to Korea in February. In the Philippines, the 29th conducted topographic surveys without the invaluable assistance of Army aviation. Air support greatly accelerates the rate of progress in field surveying, saving much time and physical work and the 29th is happy that is has become modernized with Army aviation. Our mission, in supporting the 29th, entails transporting surveyors and their equipment to selected mountain tops throughout Korea, Many AA's are familiar with the work of the 30th Engrs of Frisco who go to Alaska every summer on topo surveys. Our mission is very much like theirs and presents many of the same problems. Eighth Army Avn and TC personnel have given us '#1' support from the word, "Go." Due to the fact that our mission requires CONTINUOUS mountain peak operations under HEAVY load conditions (and it gets hot here, too), helicopters with very low engine-time PAGE 6

were issued to insure maximum power. The 40th Trans Bn (AAM) has done a commendable job in giving us depot-level maintenance support. At present, our equipment consists of an L-20, an L-19, and five (5) H-13's, which is just one short of authorized allowances.

SEVEN'S THE POINT



Sabena Belgium Airlines and KLM have regularly scheduled flights in and out of Salzburg daily. Trans Air makes unscheduled flights in and out plus extra charter flights for sightseeing. This is considerably augmented by military traffic and one night late in August we had a T-33 JET trainer drop in on us with only SIX gallons of fuel left. MANEUVERIN'

FORT LEWIS, WASHINGTON: A bumpy roadbed airstrip in a weedy clearing at Fort Lewis was home for the 44th Infantry Division's Provisional Air Company during recent maneuvers. Taking part in a command post exercise in which all 44th Division headquarters units participated, the soldier-airmen carried out tasks which would be expected of them were they in actual combat. Employing five L-19 planes and three H-23 helicopters, 10 of the Air Company's 25 pilots spent five hours in the air each day of the three-day exercise.

MAJ BRUCE FUSNER is the 44th Division air officer and commanding officer of the air company. The 25 pilots of the air company have a veteran record of 47,195 hours in the air. Of these 25 pilots, 17 have seen combat duty and have flown 6,456 hours of combat time, primarily during the Korean conflict. The command post exercises at Fort Lewis were a far cry from the action the veterans saw in Korea, but their missions were identical.

L-19 pilots in the field were Captains Joseph B Cooper, BERNARD THOMPSON, and CHAR-LES COLEMAN and 1/Lts Howard Van Zante, Charles E McLaughlin, WILLIAM COX, and Charles E Smith. Helicopter pilots were MAJ FUSNER, Maj Harold L Russell, company executive officer, and Captain William H Grady. All of the pilots saw a great deal of action during the recent EXERCISE HILL TOP maneuvers at Yakima, where they averaged 90 hours in the air. (From the PIO, Hq, 44th Inf Div.) OPERATION AIRLINE

The main activity at Heidelberg, Germany during the month of August was an Army Aviation Conference conducted by COL HARRY K BAYLESS, USAREUR Army Aviation Officer. The conference was held at Heidelberg on the 17th and 18th of August and was attended by air officers from Germany, Austria, France, Belgium, England, Italy, and Trieste. The Conference was addressed by many DA representatives. An outstanding speech was presented by MAJ WILLIAM P SULLIVAN of the USAREUR Transportation Section. He reviewed the critical supply problems that exist in this theater and recommended that the entire system of aircraft supply be changed. CAPT WILLIAM R DODD, our new C.O., gave a brief history of the unit and outlined future plans for the section. He told of the completion of the new hangar and the installation of our link trainer as well as plans to erect 100-man billets and a mess hall. Approval has also been granted for the erection of a control tower, a rotating beacon, and the installation of permanent runway lights.

Statistics for the month of June (just released) revelaed that 145 missions were completed, varying in distance from 50 to 1,500 miles. Of the 145 flights, 40% were under instrument conditions and LESS THAN 3% of the flights requested were cancelled because of weather conditions. (For the edification of those who are not stationed in Europe, we have had a very long winter this summer.) It was erroneously reported in an earlier issue that an instrument letdown and approach system had been approved for our installation. We desire and talk about a letdown for Heidelberg, but it appears to be a long way in the future.

ADF EQUIPMENT FOR ARMY AIRCRAFT - WHAT, IN WHICH, AND HOW SOON?

The story is a long one and begins 'way back in 1950. At that time, the Army obtained the first automatic direction finding (ADF) radio set, which was a commercial light weight unit designed primarily for the small private airplane. The Army came upon this set when they bought the Cessna 195 Airplane as an "off the shelf item." The 195 was delivered. painted with Army insignia, to become the LC-126 and - lo and behold - contained an ADF named the AN/ARD-8.

Some months later the AN/ARD-8 was followed by the AN/ARD-7, a 28 volt ADF. Lately, a revised and modified version of the AN/ARD-7 has undergone limited tests, which have shown considerably increased reliability. Because of this increased reliability plans are being laid to install a limited number of modified sets in the L-20 "Beaver" as a replacement for older equipments.

All of this is well and good......but what about today's immediate requirements?..... Simple. To satisfy the immediate need for ADF equipment, the AN/ARD-6 has been selected as an interim item in the larger Army aircraft pending the outcome of current tests on a light weight ADF under development. Production sets, as a result of this new development, probably won't be on the shelves until sometime late in 1956. Despite the fact that the AN/ARD-6 is too heavy for all but the largest Army aircraft, it is an equipment with an illustrious past.

Yes, many developments are presently on the designers' drawing boards, but until these items can be fully tested and approved, the old reliable AN/ARD-6 will be installed in the larger types of Army aircraft - the L-23, H-19, and their heavier cargo cousins while the new reliable version of the AN/ARD-7 will go into the L-20.

SCHOOL POOP

LT COL LEWIS W LEENEY, Chief, Army Avn Sec, Education and Special Training Branch, CMD, TAGO, DA has some interesting information for qualified officers: 'T am writing at the moment to call attention to the following which may be of interest to some of the readers. SR350-230-1 and SR 350-230-52 list the provisions for civil schooling of Regular Army officers. It might be of interest to some of the readers that spaces ARE available for this schooling in AERONAUTICAL ENGINEERING, ELECTRONICS ENGINEERING, and METEOROLOGY. The prerequisites are as follows: (1) Officers must have good grades in college mathematics, including calculus (at least C-plus or B-average); (2) Must be a college graduate, or be within one semester of graduation; (3) Must have completed his advanced course in his branch; (4) Must not be over 37 years of age; (5) Military record, efficiency-wise, must compare favorably with his contemporaries; and (6) Must agree to remain on active duty for 4 years after completion of the course.

The "CONGRATULATIONS" column is continued on P.25.

Spaces are open for courses commencing in June 1955 and consist of: One (1) in aeronautical engineering, seven (7) in electronics engineering, and one (1) in meteorology. A like number of spaces are available for courses commencing in September 1955. The particular institutions to be attended will not be determined until the individual officers to attend have been selected. Interested officers of INFANTRY, ARMOR and ARTILLERY should apply under the provisions of SR 350-230-52. In order to be considered for classes beginning in June and September 1955, application must reach Career Management Division, TAGO, no later than 2 January 1955. Officers OTHER than Infantry, Armor and Artillery officers may apply for this schooling to their respective branches, under the provisions of SR 350-230-1.



FORT RILEY, KANSAS — Four Piasecki H-25A tandem rotor helicopters arrived at Fort Riley, Kansas, from Fort Sill, Oklahoma, for assignment to the 93rd Helicopter Company training at Marshall Field. The first two machines arrived late one evening in late September and were followed with two more arriving several days later. An additional three

H-25A's were flown in by pilots of the 93rd Helicopter Company to complete the unit's complement of seven craft. Although similar machines have been used at other installations for the past several months, the "Eggbeaters" commonly known by Army aviators as the "Army Mule," are making their first appearance at Pt. Riley along with being the first tandem rotored craft ever to be used here.

The primary mission of the "Army Mule" is for pilot training purposes in the operation of tandem rotor machines prior to the graduation to heavier craft of similar construction. LT. COL. GERALD H. SHEA, Commanding Officer of the 71st Helicopter Battalion at Fort Riley stated that the seven "Windmills" will be utilized for pilot training purposes.

Powered by a 450-horsepower Continental engine the copter is capable of carrying 2 pilots and 4 passengers. The machine is also equipped to carry externally slung loads. (From the PIO, Fort Riley. Photo of Page 4).

6,000 FOOT AUTOROTATION

It's a LONG WAY from Ft Bragg to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, especially if you fly down in an H-25...On 19 Aug, four pilots and two mechanics from Ft Bragg (Maj Robert W Kolb -XVIII Abn Corps; CAPT WILLIAM G PHILLIPS, WOJG LUCIUS C FRYE, Sgt R. D. Bivens, Cpl L. B. Broberg, and yours truly, all of the 509th Hcptr Co) left Ft Bragg on a mission to deliver new rotor blocks and other spare parts to an H-19 that had suffered slight damage during a landing on Cuba's highest mountain, Pico Turquino (6200 feet elevation)...The H-19 ha been engaged in a Corps of Engrs mission down there, but was being crewed by members of the 8th Hcptr Bn of Ft Bragg....We had an interesting flight down via Key West, Havana, and the length of Cuba...A Navy PBY escorted us during the 100-mile over-water run from Key West to Havana...

We set up a repair team on the mountain, consisting of two warrant officers and two mechanics...They were on the peak five days, during which time CAPT PHILLIPS and I made daily flights to deliver the H-19 blocks, spare part,s food, water, etc...With LIGHT LOADS, the H-25 operated very nicely at the 6,200 foot level, but we think that's about the limit... If anyone has landed or taken off any higher in H-25's, we'd like to hear about it...On the 1st of Sept, the H-19 flew off the peak, but luck left us and she broke the tail rotor drive shaft, causing a thrilling 6,000 foot autorotation to the ravine on the edge of the Caribbean. The pilot, WOJG Glenn Spaulding, did a fine job and no one was hurt, but the ship is somewhat of a wreck...We're still tring to recover it ... Because of its isolated position, many problems have arisen, such as needing an LCT to carry a bulldozer in to drag it out....In the meantime, we're enjoying the hospitality of the Naval Base here at Guantanamo Bay... Flying a few missions on the side for the Navy, too ... Have enclosed 3 snapshots depicting the events Best wishes MAJ IAMES R HODGE (Ed. Note: Good photos, but we'll have to carry them over to the Nov issue in that the 60 sq. inches of photo space for this issue is already filled...The presence in Cuba of CAPT WILLIAM G PHILLIPS solves our "Phillips" problem mentioned on p. 22.....Thanks!)

Only 'Mad Dogs and Flight Examiners' go out in the midday hurricane......

We're happy to report that the Army nows sits atop this publication....During September, we received a proxy subscription from LT. GEN. ANTHONY C McAULIFFE, Commanding General of Seventh Army....It was remitted by CAPT GEORGE E THAYER, JR whose remarks accompanying the subscription follow:

"In addition to my other duties, it is my responsibility to fly General McAuliffe, the Seventh Army Commander. There are many AA's doing the same type duty. Perhaps, if each one would send in the necessary two bucks and have a year's subscription sent to his 'boss,' it would make the senior commanders more cognizant of some of our problems, gripes, desires, et al; all of which they normally would not become aware. It might be worth the try-not only would it increase circulation, it would also give us an "avenue of approach" for the so-called "little" items that normally do not warrant the writing of an official letter through channels."

The thought involved here is a sound one. Our reticence to mention this subject in the past stemmed from our opinion that the publication was not representative of the majority of the personnel in AA and that as a product it was not physically attractive. At this point, we feel that the publication reaches about 80% of the personnel in AA on either a paid or a readership basis and may therefore be considered 'representative.' As for the package, it is legible though it may not be professional. The circulation accrued from these sources is negligible but by the same token, it is this important segment of our readership that will keep both the correspondents and the Staff 'on their toes.' We heartly endorse the sponsorship of subscriptions for all unit commanders, but suggest the thought that such subscriptions be 'divvied up' among the personnel in each specific unit. So that the sponsors do not go unnoticed, we have in the past mailed a separate letter to each recipient of a gift subscription the names of those who wish to have him receive the publication. For the most part, National Guard AA's seem to endorse 'unit commanders' subscriptions. Correspondents may be interested to know that we mail monthly 'information copies' to the Chief Signal Officer, the Chief of Transportation, and the Chief of Engineers.
