

Within the National Executive Board structure, I currently serve as a National Vice President without title .. but "with portfolio." I say this because, as the Board's senior Active Army Vice President, I'm involved in the follow-on implementation of aimost every program that's developed at the national level for our Army members. Please understand that this is a broad "team" effort — there are 25 other Army members working on the Board with me, and they include several General Officers, field grade officers, aviation warrant officers, and DAC's.

To give you a brief glimpse of some of the "Army action Items" in which the National Board has a current interest, let me cite just a few of the agenda items covered at some recent Board meetings:

—A new National Award, the "Trainer of the Year Award," has been approved, staffed, and sponsored, and will be presented at a 4 December FE, Rucker ceremony to an Awardee for his or her CY 1984 accomplishment.

—The Board has taken the position that it will fully support a United States Helicopter Team effort at a possible World Helicopter Championship to be held in England in Fall, 1985.

—Acting on the wishes of a 10% sample of the membership, the Board approved the conduct of the 1987 AAAA National Convention in Nashville, Tenn., and the 1988 National Convention in Ft. Worth, Tex. The respondees were randomly-selected, i.e., every 10th member on the entire ZIP Code Roster received a questionnaire; and they covered every category of AAAA membership — Army, Reserve Components, Industry, etc.

—Also, in regard to the National Convention, the Board upped the Chapter Delegate authorizations substantially, both in number and in the dollar refund to be provided to each authorized Chapter Delegate. This action has great impact on our Chapters, the greatest number of which represent Active Army members.

There are many, many other "Army" programs in which your National Board has a sustaining interest, but space does not permit my reciting them here. I've endeavored to capsulize but a few and trust you'll agree with me that your Association and this National Board member are working for your interest.

How can we be more effective? BY BRIGADIER GENERAL WAYNE KNUDSON AVIATION OFFICER, ODCSOPS, DA

HIS month I have deviated from the normal scope of my remarks and will provide some thoughts for discussion within Army Aviation and our branch. As we reconfigure to a new aviation structure, field new equipment with increased capabilities, and re-field existing equipment, we should all be seeking an answer to a basic, but complex, question:

What new concepts of helicopter employment can we devise that will lead to a qualitative improvement in effectiveness?

The burden of this question should not be placed only on those charged with doctrine, but should be fundamental in the thought process of all concerned with Army Aviation. The proposition seems simple, and immediate responses are sprinkled with terms such as "overwatch," "lateral reinforcement," and "support." Be careful in considering your answer in order not to get caught in these traps. We must concern ourselves with innovative concepts that will lead to a **quantum** improvement in the effectiveness of helicopter employment.

A revolution in warfare

An analogy may provide a better understanding of the question. In the 1930's all major powers had tanks, but most used them to do traditional tasks, particularly providing improved fire support for the ground forces. The Germans, however, did much more. By putting tanks into combined arms formations (Panzer Divisions) and using them to lead the operational attack, they brought about a revolution in warfare. This upset the superiority of the defensive, not because of the guns or armor on the tanks, but because they could maneuver faster than the defender could reinforce. How do we conceptualize a similar change based on the modern helicopter? The time is right to demand revolutionary thought in pondering the question. I challenge all of you to think the problem through and be "innovative" in formulating practical and competitive answers to this critical question.

Moving up

A training opportunity

In September, 1982, the Army assigned an officer to the Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron One (MAWTS-1), Marine

Corps Air Station, Yuma, Arizona. This exchange assignment was made to reinforce a link between Army and Marine Corps Rotary Wing Operations. Reciprocally, a USMC officer was assigned to the 7th Squadron, 17th Cavalry, 6th Cavalry Brigade, Ft. Hood, Texas.

MAWTS-1 was commissioned on 1 June 1978. Although it is just over five years old, its involvement in graduate level Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics training can be traced to the days just after World War II when the acquisition of special weapons caused the need for special training for handling and delivery of these weapons. In the aftermath of the Vietnam conflict Marine Aviation Weapons Training Units (MAWTUs) expanded their instruction to include air-to-air tactics but the need for graduate level weapons and tactics training for all Marine Corps Aviation was becoming more apparent. In July, 1976, the Marine Corps Weapons and Tactics Training Program was established.

A top level course

One key element in this effort was the development of a Weapons and Tactics (WTI) Course at MCAS Yuma. The WTI course is a comprehensive, post-graduate course of instruction for highly experienced, fully qualified officers from all aviation communities. Officers from infantry, armor and ground supporting arms units also attend. The course includes academic instruction in threat analysis, weapons and systems capabilities, and training management and stresses integrated operations planning. The flight syllabus is designed to perfect briefing skills and debriefing skills and airborne instructional and evaluation techniques. The course culminates in a large scale, combined arms exercise encompassing all facets of the Marine Air Ground team, planned and executed by the students.

Since 1978, MAWTS-1 has provided academic and/or flight instruction to the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Ft. Campbell, KY; 9th Infantry Division, Ft. Lewis, WA; 6th Cavalry Brigade, Ft. Hood, TX; USA Engineering Flight Activity, Edwards AFB, CA; Operations Group, Ft. Irwin, CA; 82nd Airborne Division, Ft. Bragg, NC; 163rd Cavalry, Utah National Guard; 3rd Amored Cavalry Regiment, Ft. Bliss, TX; 3rd Combat Aviation Bn, Wurtzburg FRG; 1st Infantry Division, Ft. Riley, KS; 7th Combat Aviation Bn, Ft. Ord, CA; 1st SOCOM, Ft. Bragg, NC; and 160th Aviation Bn, Ft. Campbell, KY. Numerous Army pilots have graduated from the seven week, WTI course composed of three weeks of academics and four weeks of flight training. The course provides excellent insight into command and control of large unit operations. An element of the course, air-to-air combat training, has been popular with Army units and is available separately.

Because the Army and Marines have historically participated in joint operations and may expect to do so again, I encourage unit commanders to consider this excellent training opportunity. An understanding of Marine Air Operations could be significant. The Army officer now assigned to MAWTS-1 is CPT John F. Finan, Jr., autovon 951-2967 or commercial (602) 726-2967. He will be pleased to answer your questions and assist in your training needs.

1985 WHC

The Federation Aeronautique Internationale (FAI) Helicopter Committee met on September 4, 1984 at Farnborough, England, to discuss the site selection for the next World Helicopter Championships (WHC). As you know, the United States Helicopter Team won the championship in 1981. As the reigning World Champions, the USA received the first opportunity to be the next host. The USA offered to host the proposed 1984 WHC at Ft. Rucker, the "Home of Army Aviation" but because of the financial burden of transporting teams from Europe to the USA, the majority of FAI countries declined the USA 1984 WHC invitation.

The USA, in conjunction with the Helicopter Club of America (HCA), has relinquished the right to host the next WHC to the United Kingdom. This was done to financially accomodate members of the FAI and promote a proposed 1985 WHC in Europe. United States participation in the proposed 1985 WHC is being considered at this time.

BG O. Glenn Goodhand dies at 75; Was three-time AAAA President

Brigadier General O. Glenn Goodhand, Ret., a member of the U.S. Army Aviation Hall of Fame, and a founder and past President of the Army Aviation Association of America, died on September 11 at his home in McLean, VA, after a long illness.

General Goodhand was born in Brooklyn, NY, in 1909 and was educated at the Phillips Exeter Academy and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Following his graduation from MIT with a Bachelor's degree in Engineering Administration in 1931, he received a Reserve Commission as a Second Lieutenant in the Army. He was employed by the Eastman Kodak Company in a managerial capacity and earned a private pilot's license prior to going on active duty with the Army in 1942 as an artillery liaison pilot.

Army Aviation pioneer

Glenn Goodhand was inducted into the Army Aviation Hall of Fame in 1975 for his contributions during the 1942 - 49 period. During the Second World War, he accumulated more than 500 combat flying hours, and improvised unique and effective aerial tactics still utilized to this day.

In Italy, he conducted pioneer experimental work in night flying on the Cassino Front with light observation aircraft, on his own initiative as a Captain, and devised feasible methods for adjusting artillery fire at night far beyond normal daytime observation ranges. In doing so, he personally flew 16 night missions deep behind enemy lines.

Subsequently, at the Anzio Beachhead, he developed a control system for Corps Artillery aircraft which assured continuous observation of target areas, provided for engagement by the

most appropriate artillery units, and gave our spotter pilots timely warning of the approach of enemy fighter aircraft.

During the invasion of Southern France, as a Major and VI Corps Aviation Officer, he organized a unit of light aircraft for reconnaissance ahead of advancing ground units in addition to his normal artillery observation duties. This unit developed and employed unprecedented techniques for the direction of P-47 fighter-bomber attacks on targets beyond normal artillery range.

Glenn Goodhand retired from the Army in 1964 as a Brigadier General and Master Army Aviator, the highest level of pilot achievement within the U.S. Army. He subsequently worked for many years as the Washington Representative of the Boeing Vertol Company and served three terms as AAAA President during 1965 - 68. He is survived by his wife, Jo, his sons Robert and Oscar, and 7 grandchildren.

The high esteem which he is held is illustrated by the fact that, prior to knowing of **Glenn's** serious illness, the Commandant of the U.S. Army Aviation Center at Fort Rucker, AL, had proposed that the new flight simulation training facility on post be named in his honor.

The Board of the AAAA Scholarship Foundation has voted to establish a permanent \$1,000 annual scholarship in **General Goodhand's** memory. Donations may be sent to the AAAA Scholarship Foundation, One Crestwood Road, Westport, CT 06880.

COL Gordon J. Wolf, '44-45 School Commandant, dies

Colonel Gordon J. Wolf, USAR (Ret.), another pioneer from the era when the "Grasshoppers" founded modern Army Aviation, died in Austin, TX, on September 7th. A member of the "Class Before One," he served as the Director of the Department of Flight Training at Ft. Sill, OK, during 1944 - 45. He was buried in the Fort Sam Houston National Cemetary on September 10, and is survived by his widow, Eve. IIIII







With FLIR, its mission capabilities will extend into the night. And after each flight it returns to its retrieval net to be readied for another sortie.

There's an alternative to exposing a multimillion dollar aircraft and its crew to the risks of many tactical missions: Aquila—the tough bird that gives flexibility to commanders and nothing but trouble to the enemy.

SCIENCE SCOPE

U.S. troops will be able to communicate reliably at extended ranges with a new family of high-frequency tactical radios. Three versions of the improved high frequency radios (IHFR) will operate beyond normal line-of-sight and over rough terrain, including desert, mountain, and jungle environments. The radios combine totally automatic tuning with high performance in a rugged lightweight package. Units are constructed in modules to permit rapid troubleshooting and repair and to allow for improvements as new technology is developed.

One radio is a 20-watt Manpack unit (AN/PRC-104) that is carried on a soldier's back. The second is a 20-watt radio (AN/GRC-213) deployed on vehicles. The third is a 400-watt high-power mobile command radio for use over longer ranges. Hughes Aircraft Company produces the radios for the Army.

<u>A new kind of helicopter-mounted rocket launcher</u>—which has proven to be less costly, more durable, and lighter than existing models—has been made possible by an advanced manufacturing technique developed by Hughes in producing TOW antitank guided missiles. The U.S. Army launcher is made in two versions, one for 19 rockets, the other for 7. Although inexpensive enough to be disposable, the launcher can be reused for as many as 32 firings.

Weight and cost savings stem from using an electromagnetic force to press the aluminum skin and tubes of the launcher into the three aluminum support structures. This process greatly cuts labor costs and lowers the weight associated with such conventional metalworking techniques as welding.





Cash award prizes upped six-fold for Membership Enrollment Contest

AAAA is now in its THIRD month of the '84-'85 Membership Enroliment Competition, and the goalposts have been moved closer!

In an effort to spur both large and small Chapters, the National Executive Board approved a six-fold increase in the cash award prizes that will be presented to the winning Chapters at the 1985 National Convention.

Instead of one "Membership Gain" and "One Percentage Gain" Competition for all Chapters, the Board approved a plan wherein:

(1) It will open BOTH competitions — "Membership" and "Percentage" Gain — to each of **THREE** categories of Chapter size — in effect, holding **SIX** separate Competitions, instead of just two.

(2) It will limit the number of "Competitior Chapters" to those within a Chapter's AAAA category — large, medium, or small, or as re-named, Master, Senior, and AAAA Chapters. The Chapter's category was determined by its 1 August membership standing.

The three separate Cash Awards are \$1,000, \$500, and \$350 for "Membership Gain" and the other three cash awards are \$500, \$250, and \$175 for "Percentage Gain."

Go for It!

New selection and submission rules developed for AAAA nat'l awards

The selection and submission policies relating to CY 84 AAAA National Awards, as pursued by both Regions and Chapters, have been modified by the National Executive Board with its adoption of the following Putnam-Marr proposal:

"Normally, nominations for National Awards will be submitted directly to the National Awards Committee. However, an AAAA Region may elect to appoint its own Awards Committee to nominate candidates for the various awards. All nominations within a Region should then be considered by the Regional Awards Committee and only the winners of the Regional competition will be accepted for consideration by the National Awards Committee as candidates in the national selection process.

"Should a Chapter that Is NOT within a Regional organization choose to organize its own selection process, then all nominations from within the Chapter area should be considered by that Chapter Awards Committee, and only the winners of that Chapter selection process will be considered by the National Awards Committee.

"This policy, as it applies to Regional or Chapter Awards Committees, is permissive and should NOT be construed to mean that Regions or Chapters are required to have a nomination and selection process."

Last Hurrah?

Amidst rumors that the AFRC will not permit AAAA's USAREUR Region to utilize the Garmisch facility beyond 1985 during ski season, the Regional Board is continuing with its plans to hold its 26th Regional Convention the week of March 16-23. The nine-chapter organization sponsored its 5th Aviation Ball on November 3.
